Welcome to Recruitment!

Recruiting youth to join Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, or Ventures is a very rewarding and fulfilling experience. Scouting has something to offer to all ages. Recruiting is all about getting out in the community and having a presence. Successful units are visible, inviting, and fun! In previous years our main recruitment focus has been "School Night for Scouting". This will remain an important part of our efforts, but we are focusing on year-round recruitment. Northern Star Council is looking to increase our Scouting membership to 33,000 youth by December 31, 2018.

Actively recruiting is critical to your recruiting success. Some examples are hosting a *bring-a-friend event* at your unit, showing a strong Scouting presence at a parade, being visible in the community, or doing service projects. Parents and youth looking to join a unit will often look at social media to see how active a unit is. When we are out in the community as Scouts, we are showing what Scouting has to offer and the lifelong skills Scouting teaches.

How do we Recruit?

- 1. **Connecting with your local school** It can be a challenge to get into your local school. Offering to volunteer at the school often open doors.
 - Contact the School Parent Teacher Student Association to ask if there is any way your unit can assist the school with volunteer opportunities
 - Offer to help with carnival nights, bingo nights, international nights, school picnics, or sports events
 - Ask your school if you can put something in the school's newsletter
- 2. **Social media** When families are looking for a unit, the first place they turn to is social media. They look to see what your unit is doing, if it is active, inviting, and if the Scouts are having fun.
 - Unit website Does your unit have one? Is it current? Does it have pictures of what you have done in the last year? An important item is there a current unit calendar posted so families can see what the unit has planned?
 - Unit Facebook page Have you posted about your unit's activities recently? (If you are on unsure about how to use Facebook and other social media outlets here are some guidelines.

 - Community Facebook Pages/Next Door App Posting in these community groups helps families who
 may be considering Scouting to not only come and check out your unit, but also introduce families who
 may not have thought about Scouting and what it is all about.
- **3.** Local events Having your unit participate in the event is just the first step. Our units with the best success in recruiting also have information on their unit, pictures of youth having fun, and next steps to learn more about Scouting. Some examples:
 - Wayzata Schools Area Plymouth on Parade, James J Hill Days, Fire and Ice Festival, Kids fest
 - Community Events 4th July Parade, Community 5K and 10K, kids races, Trunk or Treat, Night to Unit
 - Long Lake Corn Days
 - Chaska River City Days, Touch-a-Truck

4. Contact local daycares in your area to recruit incoming kindergartners

- Units can host an activity session for all the kids at the daycare, Hand out information to the incoming Kindergarten parents.
- 5. **Bring-a-Friend activities -** This is like a try-before-you-buy concept. Ask your Scouts to invite a friend to a Scouting event
 - Pack, troop, crew, den meetings
 - Summertime activities
 - Unit outings
 - Fundraising Pancake Breakfast

- Meeting with Community Relations Executive, School Principal to talk through SNFS
- Reserving recruiting and SNFS items from the District PRE
- Requesting recruitment materials from the district website

Tips to Putting an Information Booth Together

- 1. GO BIG IF YOU CAN Going big will draw attention. Having a big display helps draw kids and parents to you.
- 2. BOLD and COLORFUL Going bold and colorful will makes your table or event stand out.
- 3. PRESENCE (Boys, Girls, and Adult Leaders in Uniform) Having adult leaders and Scouts walking around your event will make them stand out.
- **4. INFORMATION PACKETS** Talk about the FUN points of Scouting. Boys and girls are really drawn in and pay attention when you talk about activities. Many times, there is a misconception of Scouting as some boring activity where you sit at someone's house. When you start to mention camping, archery, BB guns, rockets, pinewood derby, rock climbing . . . you will see their interest start to show.
- 5. ALWAYS TAKE NAMES and CONTACT INFORMATION Make sure to get the parent's name and contact information. Make sure to follow-up with them with a phone call and a personal invite to see what Scouting is about. Reach out to prospective parents a few days prior to School Night for Scouting (SNFS) to remind parents to sign up that night. After SNFS make follow-up calls, and provide a second chance for parents to come in and sign up at your unit's orientation night.

Tips to Recruiting - Events

- OPEN HOUSE -The best recruitment is when all potential Scouts are in one place. Be part of an open house or other school events.
- **COMMUNITY EVENTS** Any community events you can be a part of shows the community that you part of it, and there is a chance for recruitment. Parades, community event days, or anything that your community does, get involved!
- **NIGHT TO UNITE** If your neighborhood does Night to Unite get involved.
- PROVIDE SERVICE Participate in community events (clean up days, Salvation Army bell-ringing, planting flowers, volunteering at community events)

After School Open House

After a school open house - or any event – it is important to follow up with each contact by email or by phone call. Thank them for their interest in Scouting and invite them - if they want to start right away - to attend the September orientation or pack meeting.

SAMPLE EMAILS:

"Kindergarten through fifth grade boys and girls are all invited. Cub Scouting is a year-round program designed to prepare our youth to be responsible citizens through FUN! Meet up 2-3 times a month with your friends for games, activities and awards. Bring the whole family a few times during the year. Escape with your parent for 1:1 day camp; or overnight a couple of times a year."

"Pack/Troop (...) is hosting a recruitment night on (date) at the following location. If you can't wait, AND you want to start right now, then just let us know."

"Registration fee is (cost). This includes the handbook, neckerchief, badges earned throughout the year, AND our unit T-shirt. Scouting strives to stay affordable and offers fundraising opportunities as well as scholarships. Please contact (name) to learn more"

The week prior to School Night for Scouting, call each contact personally to remind them about School Night for Scouting (SNFS) and ask if they have any questions about Scouting.

48 hours prior to SNFS send out a reminder email about coming to sign up that night!

School Night for Scouting Set-Up

School Night for Scouting (SNFS) is meant to be a quick in-and-out sign up. Have a few tables where parents can sit and fill out applications. Have plenty of adult leaders available to answer questions that parents may have. Have a table set up with a display that contains some Scouting memorabilia.

Have an activity for youth to work on while parents are filling out applications. Consider partnering with a troop to help you with this. It is also very effective to see teenagers demonstrating the skills they learn in Scouting!

After School Night for Scouting, take the application forms to the district turn-in location at Minnetonka Community Center, Thursday, September 20th from 7-9PM. Don't forget a pack check to pay for the registration. You will also need the sizes of the T-shirt for each NEW Cub Scout.

Unit Information Folders

Have a folder for each new youth interested in joining Scouting. Before they leave, give them a welcome folder containing the following information:

- 1. Welcome letter
- 2. Camping information
- 3. Application form
- 4. Uniform Scout Shop information
- 5. Literature about council camps
- 6. Parent Talent Survey
- 7. Pack calendar
- 8. Parent orientation reminder

(Suggestion: always have 20-30 packets ahead of events, and 5 as spares throughout the year).

Recruitment and SNFS Incentives

Any Scout who recruits a friend will receive the Recruiter Patch to be worn on their uniform. In addition, they will receive the following:

- **Cub Scouts** The new Cub Scout gets a FREE T-shirt and Day Camp registration. If pack recruitment goals are met all the Scouts in the pack get tickets to Crayola Experience.
- **Boy Scouts** Recruit a friend: both you and your friend receive a pocket knife once your Totin' Chip card has been earned.

Recruitment Obstacles

- 1. Too Busy: Families today are busy accommodate families for the time they have
 - If the family can only make certain meetings and events, provide them with what need to do activities at home so they can catch up on their own.
 - Don't waste their time make sure meetings start and end on time and are well organized. If they see the value in the time investment they will continue to attend.
 - If a prospective Scout cannot attend pack or den meetings because of conflicts (religious education, hockey, etc.) work with the parents so that they can attend when they can or recommend another local pack.

2. Scouting is too expensive

- Make sure to budget scholarships for pack dues and camping as part of annual budget. Scholarships are available through Northern Star Council and Lake Minnetonka District.
- Uniforms can be purchased at the Used Uniform Sale held once-a-month at the Leadership Center, or at thrift shops (especially around Halloween).

3. Doing the same program every year

- Come up with new and innovative activities for the Scouts to do (they love it!)
- Network with other leaders for ideas (social media, Wood Badge, etc.)
- Make sure leaders are fully trained for their position

Recruiting for Troops

- 1. Work with your local Cub Scout packs. Stronger packs will benefit the troops by providing a larger pool of incoming Scouts each year.
- 2. Be present at pack summertime activities.
- 3. Ask packs to help with your community events.
- 4. Participate in the den chief program. Build a personal connection with Cub Scouts so when they cross over they are more likely to stay with your troop.
- 5. Many Scouts drop out in the first 6-12 months. Formulate a plan to retain them. Educate parents about the differences between Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts, and how Boy Scouts is a youth led program.
- 6. Invite a local Webelos den to camp with your troop.
- 7. Bring-a-friend events work for troops, too!
- 8. Be active on social media Facebook/Insta/Twitter/Snap. Youth are technologically savvy and are active on social media.
- 9. Ask your Scouts they have great ideas. Implement those ideas to increase recruitment.
- 10. Work with multiple local packs. Your troop will be in big trouble if you source your Scouts from one pack and that pack has problems.

Webelos Transition - How it plays a part in Recruitment into Troops

The NEW Trailhead Award is a NEW award that recognizes those Webelos who have gone above and beyond their Arrow of Light requirements and have a strong start on their Scouts BSA adventure. The pack and troop must work together to ensure that all Webelos transitioning into a troop have the opportunity to enjoy the complete Scouting adventure and earn this award.

- 1. Earn the Arrow of Light award plus 3 additional activity pins.
- 2. Attend one Scouts BSA outing or a troop Court of Honor, and attend one regular Scouts BSA meeting.
- 3. Complete three hours of community service with a troop.
- 4. Join and actively attend a troop of your choice.



Pack 477 invites you to consider having your son and/or daughter to participate in the Cub Scout program as a member of our pack. We are mindful not to overwhelm you with information, we'd like to lay out how the program works.

There are 3 key goals of Cub Scouting: Good Citizenship, Positive Character Development, and Personal Fitness. All the aspects of the program flow from these 3 goals. Our motto is "Do Your Best".

Organization Structure: Our Pack Meetings are held at Christ Memorial Lutheran Church in the fellowship hall. We are part of Northern Star Council (Lake Minnetonka District). The pack is made up of age/grade specific groups called Dens: K-5th grade.

(Lion-K, Tiger-1st, Wolf-2nd, Bear 3rd, Webelos 4th, Arrows 5th)



Meetings

<u>Den:</u> (small group of boys/girls in the same grade led by the den leader) meets once a month. Cub Scouts will focus on projects and achievements toward the specific rank the Cub Scouts are working on. Den Leaders may have some fun field trips planned for achievements outside of your den meetings. All Den's Meet on the following Monday Nights at the Church:

1st Sunday: Lions (Kindergarten) @3pm & Tigers (1st Grade) @4pm

1st Monday: Wolves (2nd Grade) @6:30pm

2nd Monday: Bears (3rd Grade) @7pm

3rd Monday: Webelo's (4th Grade) @6:30pm

4th Monday: Arrows (5th Grade) @7pm

Pack: (large group made up of all the dens)

Regular pack meetings: Once a month at Christ Memorial Lutheran Church. Meetings are held once a month on a Sunday starting at 4:00pm with the flag ceremony. These meetings focus on one of the 12 LAWS of Scouting (Trustworthy, Loyal, Helpful, Friendly, Courteous, Kind, Obedient, Cheerful, Thrifty, Brave, Clean, Reverent).

Parent: Parents meet once a month to plan the pack meeting and upcoming events. Meetings are held once a month on a Thursday from 7pm-8:30pm. We ask 1 parent and all Den Leaders to attend. We cover a lot of important information on training, district information and make all Pack decisions at these meetings. We encourage all Feedback!

UNIFORMS: There are 2 types of uniform, Class A or Class B (Pack t-shirt): Scouts are expected to wear the Class A uniform to all Den and Pack Meetings. These can be purchased at any scout shop. Class B t-shirts are handed out upon joining!







<u>Costs:</u> Annual den dues are \$... per scout, in addition to any camping fees they go on. We do fundraisers throughout the year to help with the cost of scouts. Wreaths, popcorn and pancake breakfast. Dues cover: awards, books, pack supplies, and activities. We do have scholarships available please ask the Committee Chair

<u>Training:</u> ALL adults are required to take Youth Protection Training. All training is available online. We also have our leaders receive additional training so they feel comfortable in whatever roles they take on. Rank Specific training is required for adults who volunteer to be leaders. Some roles are more of a commitment that others.

Family Involvement: Scouting is really a joint adventure for the whole family including siblings, parents, grandparents. We also need parents to participate in making the pack run smoothly. There are lots of ways to help out.

Thank You for considering getting your son/daughter and family involved with Scouting. Scouting is fun with a purpose. We think it is a wonderful program and hope we can make it so for your son and your family.


