Camporee Description

Come join your fellow Boy Scouts, Ventures, Webelos, and Bear Scouts from the Lake Minnetonka District for our Fall Camporee 2018 at the River Valley Ranch, September 21-23, 2018.

Venue - Located on 480 private acres in Carver, Minnesota on the shores of the beautiful Minnesota River. This location is fantastic! There are dense woods, open fields, and secluded areas. In fact, it is considered one of the best trail ride locations in the Twin Cities!

Create Your Own Unit Activities – We are once again using our popular carnival atmosphere format. What that means is each unit is allowed the flexibility of choosing from the activities provided by the district and/or running their own specific activities. In other words, a unit can schedule a trail ride and blacksmith activity and/or run your own unit activity such as fishing, hiking, or orienteering. The possibilities are almost endless.

Merit Badge Opportunities - Partial credit will be given for the following merit badges: Metalwork, Wilderness Survival, Horsemanship, and Fishing. Please have your Scouts bring a filled out blue card. Those working on Metalwork Merit Badge should bring food-grade metal cans for their metalwork project. Anyone working on Fishing Merit Badge should plan on bringing their personal tackle, bait, and pole.

Hiking/ Backpacking - There are miles and miles of trails - get that 10-miler done (suggested Troop managed activity).

Programming and Activities - Program and activities will include a one-hour horseback trail ride, the campfire program, unit competitions such as western-themed cast iron cooking contest, field games, the climbing tower, and best campsite.

Wilderness Survival - Build a shelter and sleep in the woods.

Webelos and Bears - Webelos and Bears are absolutely encouraged to attend. They can participate in all activities and competitions.

Adventure Loops/ Pins Opportunities - Many of the requirements for adventures can be completed at the camporee through planned activities, with your unit, and/or during preparation for this camporee. Consider working on any or all of the following:

Webelos Adventure Pins: Outdoorsman; Webelos Walkabout; Cast Iron Chef; Castaway; Into the Woods; Into the Wild

Bear Adventure Belt Loops: Bear Necessities; Bear Picnic Basket; Fur, Feathers, and Ferns; A Bear Goes Fishing (bringing your own tackle, bait, and pole)

Webelos/ Bears are encouraged to attend with a parent. Webelos may attend as part of a Troop and work on their Scouting Adventure Pin. Webelos/ Bears and their parents are welcome to stay the night(s) with a parent or just spend the day on Saturday participating in the camporee events.

Those Webelos who would like spend the night with a parent are in encouraged to make arrangements to camp with a Troop, or contact Scott.Janke@lmdbsa.org and he will locate a Troop for you.

It will be a fantastic event that you won't want to miss!

Theme - This is a western-themed event, so dress and cook appropriately. In other words, wear your cowboy hats and boots (no side arms please*) and the use of *lots of beans* in the Dutch oven is expected and appreciated.

*Pursuant Scout policy, Scouts are not to include replica firearms in their Western-themed outfits.

Cost Per Person

- \$15.00 **Tent Overnight + Saturday Activities** - Bring Your Own Tent Camping either Friday or Saturday or both. Includes Saturday Activities, all programs and events, merit badge and adventure loop/pin offerings, and camporee patch (trail ride extra)
- \$15.00 **Saturday Day Only** - includes Saturday Activities, all programs and events, merit badge and adventure loop/pin offerings, and camporee patch (trail ride extra).
- \$30.00 **One - Hour Trail Ride (optional)** - Adults should not plan to ride. However, if there are empty spots, adults may pay the ranch directly and ride with the Scouts
- \$3.00 **Metal Working Merit Badge (optional)**

Units Attending From Other Districts

Units from other districts are welcome to attend. The only limitation would be the one-hour trail ride. Units will be able to participate in all other actives and programs. We have a limited number of trail-rides available and we will give priority to Lake Minnetonka District Scouts/ Venturers. The chances are good, but not guaranteed, that your Scouts/ Venturers will be able to participate in the one-hour trail ride.

Please register to attend the camporee. However, the registration system will not allow you to purchase the trail-ride portion of your registration until September 11, 2018. At that time you will be able to register for the trail-ride, if there are any open spots left.

General Information

Attendance All Boys Scouts, Venture, Webelos and Bear Cub Scouts and their parents are invited to participate.

Check-in Upon arrival either Friday evening, or Saturday morning. Pre-registration is mandatory through the online registration process. No on-site registration is available.

One adult leader (i.e., Scoutmaster) and one youth leader (i.e., SPL) should check-in your entire unit at one time.

At check-in, you will be asked to provide:

- **The Unit Attendance Form** (attached to this Informational Packet) with the names of all Scouts and adults planning to participate in the program and your patrols.
- **All medical forms** for each participant must be kept on-site, secure, and accessible.
- **A list and time of visitors** (non-Scouters) visiting camp.
- **The time you plan to check out**, so we can inspect your campsite.

Once you have been checked-in, you will be directed to your designated camping area.

Every effort will be made to assign your unit to a campsite appropriate for the size of your unit. We ask that you set up your campsite in the area designated for you. We have planned the locations of our program areas to minimize the amount of traffic through your camping areas and to avoid having distractions too near to the program areas.

Camping Tent camping will be in a grass field with vehicle access (meadow camping). Please no motor homes or pop up tent trailers. Camping is rugged. There will be no picnic tables. Campfire Program

Your troop, patrol, crew, or den is encouraged to do a skit or song at the Saturday night campfire program. Please have your skit approved by your Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, or Advisor.

First Aid

Please have the proper medical forms and permission slips handy for every Scout when you check in. The medical form is found on the camporee resources page (link below).

Medical Forms

Please have the proper medical forms and permission slips handy for everyone when you check in. The BSA Annual Health and Medical Record form (Parts A & B required) is found at <http://www.lmdbsa.org/2018FallCamporee>. Youth as well as Adult Leaders are required to complete the BSA medical form, sections A and B.

Campfires

Campfires are allowed, however, you will need to collect your own downed fire wood from the woods, and build your own fire ring. No cutting of live trees is allowed. Please follow all BSA rules on fire-building and tool usage. All wood gathered must be burned prior to departure.

Water

There is a water spigot within walking distance of the campsite. Be prepared to carry your water to your campsite OR bring water with you to the camporee.

Uniforms

Scouts and adult leaders should be in activity uniforms (class B) for Saturday events and activities. Scouts and adult leaders are expected to dress in field uniform (class A) for travel, for your cooking competition presentation, as well as the Scout's Own Service on Sunday.

Bring

1. Bring your medical form, trail ride permission slip, blue cards (as needed), tent, sleeping bag, sleeping mat (optional), personal clothing/gear, camp/sports chair, cookware, stoves, plates, cups, utensils, dish washing equipment, trash bag, hiking boots, walking shoes, work gloves, fishing gear (if fishing), non-perishable food items for donation (optional), and dress for the weather. Remember to bring your food for your meals, **INCLUDING BEANS**.
2. Bring your recipes, ingredients, and any cooking equipment for the western themed cast iron cooking competition. See 'Cast Iron Western Cooking Competition' above for additional information.
3. If there is any chance you will be horseback riding, bring: your Trail Ride Release of Liability Form, long pants, closed toed shoes (with a heel, if possible), **NO SANDLES**, and an equestrian or bicycle helmet.

Parking

Parking for your vehicle and trailer is available. Trailers and vehicles may be parked at your campsite, but all vehicles are expected to remain parked throughout the weekend. If the vehicle must be used, do not park near the campsite. We do not want vehicles moving through the campsite. Campground

Please be respectful of your campsite and remember 'Leave No Trace'. Bring plastic bags; all garbage is to be packed out.

Color Coded Wristbands

Wristbands will be provided at Cracker Barrel. The wristbands indicate if a Trail Ride Release of Liability Form (below and located here <http://www.lmdbsa.org/2018FallCamporee>) was received by the district. The color of the wristband indicates the time period of the trail ride. Without a wristband, Scouts will not be able to ride a horse.

Camporee Patch

A Fall Camporee 2018 patch will be provided in your check-in packet.



Camporee Policies

The following rules were made to help us have a successful and safe camping experience. It is the responsibility of the adults in charge to see that Scouts know and understand these rules. Anyone violating them may be asked to leave the camp.

Behavior: Scout Oath and Scout Law – applies to all Scouts and Scouters. Please emphasize the “good sport” and “do your best” aspects of Scouting. First and foremost, we’re here to have fun.

Vehicles: Speed limit is 10 mph. No passengers in back of truck or trailer. Vehicles are limited to main roads and parking areas only. For information regarding parking, please see the section above titled ‘Parking’.

Firearms: Personal firearms, ammunition (live or expended), explosives, fireworks, and toy weaponry are prohibited.

Adults: At least one responsible adult (21 or older) must be in camp at all times. You must observe the BSA Leadership Requirements of “two-deep leadership” and the youth/adult ratios, which can be found on the camporee page at <http://www.lmdbsa.org/2018FallCamporee>. For Webelos/ Bears: **each** Webelos/ Bear Scout at the camporee must be accompanied by a parent or guardian (a 1:1 ratio). It is recommended that all adults take the updated BSA Youth Protection Training (YPT) at <https://my.scouting.org/>.

Knives: NO straight-bladed knives are allowed in camp.

Lights out: Scouts are not allowed out of their campsite after lights-out with the exception of to-and-from the latrines. Please respect others during lights-out. Scouters are asked to bring roaming Scouts to the headquarters after lights-out.

Radios: No radios. Use of electronics should be kept to a minimum.

Registration of Units Outside of Lake Minnetonka District: Please see the section ‘Units Attending from Other Districts’ above. Registration for all Districts closes September 19, 2018 at 11:55pm.

Refund Policy: Refunds will be made at the discretion of the event chairman.
